
The Role of Congregations of Religious at the UN

Catholic Religious NGO Presence at the UN

 In the UN system, we are considered NGOs (nongovernmental organizations)

 ~30 NGOs accredited to represent over 200 Catholic Religious congregations



What does it mean to be accredited?

Accreditation allows NGOs to participate in UN proceedings by:

- Making oral statements
- Submitting written statements
- Meeting with diplomats
- Participating in UN conferences
- Sponsoring events inside and near UN Headquarters
- Making formal or informal recommendations on new UN agreements as they are being negotiated
- Submitting reports and comments on nations' progress on human rights (or lack thereof)

Religious Voice at the UN

- Credible: provide insights from members' work ministering to the poorest and most vulnerable populations "on the ground"
- Impartial: represent communities that span many nations and have no national identity
- Rooted in morals/values: known for deep, personal and communal dedication to care for human dignity of all and for the natural environment
- Steady and stable: maintain positions based on constitutions and principles older than UN and many nations; bring continuity and cohesion that governments with frequently changing leaders/politics cannot

The Mission of the UN & the Prophetic Call of Religious Life

THE UN CHARTER:

WE, THE <u>PEOPLES</u> OF THE UNITED NATIONS, DETERMINED

- to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind, and
- to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small, and
- to establish conditions under which justice and respect for the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of international law can be maintained, and
- to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

THE UN CHARTER:

AND FOR THESE ENDS

- to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbours, and
- to unite our strength to maintain international peace and security, and
- to ensure, by the acceptance of principles and the institution of methods, that armed force shall not be used, save in the common interest, and
- to employ international machinery for the **promotion of the** economic and social advancement of all peoples...

THE SPIRITUAL IS POLITICAL


People of faith are called not only to counteract unjust politics and economics through charitable works but also to *transform* those unjust systems to eradicate the suffering that demands charity.
