This guide was produced by the <u>Justice Coalition of Religious</u> (JCoR), a coalition of 22 non-governmental organizations that are accredited to collectively represent over 200 congregations of Roman Catholic women and men Religious at the United Nations (UN). For centuries, congregations of Religious have served people who have been rendered poor, vulnerable, oppressed, and marginalized by existing global systems. Through our membership in JCoR, we have united with our sister and brother organizations to enhance collaboration among our members - at UN Headquarters and around the world - in our common mission: to improve quality of life for people who are living in poverty and to enhance our stewardship of the natural environment.

The primary aim of our collaboration is to strengthen the capacity of Catholic Religious and their partners to address the root causes of human and environmental suffering.

We work toward this goal by coordinating national, regional, and global efforts of Religious to call on political leaders to take action for a just, equitable, and rights-based implementation of the **Sustainable Development Goals** (SDGs), the United Nations' Agenda for 2015-2030.

WHAT IS THE UN WATER CONFERENCE?

At the current rate of progress, the international community will not realize the <u>Human Rights to Water and Sanitation</u> or reach the water-related targets of the <u>Sustainable Development Agenda</u> by 2030. Water is critically important to development – from health and nutrition, to gender equity and economics, and in the coming years, water-related challenges will only continue to increase in urgency. We need to accelerate progress, and we need to act now.

Nearly 50 years after the first UN Water Conference, the General Assembly will convene the <u>UN 2023 Water Conference</u> to unite the world for water. It will serve as a midterm review of the implementation of the objectives of the <u>International Decade for Action on Water for Sustainable Development</u>. Fundamentally, the Conference aims to enhance understanding of the value and management of water and encourage concerted action to achieve the internationally agreed water-related goals and targets.

GOAL:

The primary goal of the Conference is to raise awareness of the global water crisis and commit to joint action(s) to achieve the internationally agreed water-related goals and targets, such as <u>Sustainable Development Goal 6</u> (SDG6: Clean Water and Sanitation) of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

OUTCOME:

The Conference will adopt the <u>Water Action Agenda</u> as its main outcome. The Agenda will be the amalgamation of all voluntary water-related commitments — pledges to act, made by governments, civil society, and stakeholders from all sectors. Its central aim is to mobilize action, across the entire world, to advance progress on and meet the water-related goals and targets of the 2030 Agenda. The key building blocks of the Water Action Agenda are committing to action, ensuring actions can be scaled up and replicated in the years to come, and implementing follow-up and review processes to share learnings and accelerate positive change.

The overarching goal of SDG6 is to ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all. Access to safe water and sanitation is a basic human need for health and well-being. It is a foundational building block of sustainable development.

Five Thematic Areas of the Conference

- Water for health: Access to safe drinking water, hygiene and sanitation are essential for human health and play a significant role in environmental health too
- Water for sustainable development: Water is vitally important to sustainable growth, including livelihoods, justice, food security, energy, and economic development
- Water for climate, resilience and environment: Sustainable use of water resources is fundamental to managing climate and environmental emergencies, maintaining vital biodiversity, and building resilience to the impacts of climate change
- Water for cooperation: Water cooperation between communities and countries can deliver shared economic, social, and environmental benefits, as well as promote peace
- Water Action Decade: 2023 marks the middle of the Water Action Decade and the midpoint of the 2030 Agenda. Action on both must be accelerated to secure a sustainable future for all

Human Rights to Water and Sanitation

The United Nations recognizes both access to water and sanitation as human rights - fundamental to dignity, health, and development.

The right to water *entitles everyone to have access to sufficient, safe, acceptable, physically accessible, and affordable water.*

The right to sanitation *entitles everyone to have physical and affordable access to sanitation that is safe, hygienic, secure, and socially and culturally acceptable*



Scoping solidarity: Societal dialogues for water justice


21 March, 3:00pm-5:00pm (New York time)

Water and Integral Development of Communities: Challenges and Proposals


24 March, 8:30am-10:00am (New York time)
