3-Step Reflection

1. Consider the communities you serve and your congregation

2. Consider your ministry itself

3. Consider the role of government

Step 1:



- Where/how are women and girls being impacted by technological innovation or digital education?
- Which groups of women and girls face the most profound impacts?
- What specific businesses, groups, or phenomena are generating the most profound impacts in these communities?
- Where/how are women and girls taking leadership in technology, innovation or digital education in these communities?

Step 2:

When I think of my ministry...

- Where/how is this ministry attempting to address the impacts or benefits of technological innovation on women and/or girls in the community we serve?
- Where/how is this ministry fostering the leadership of women and/or girls in technological innovation?
- How does involvement of women and girls in our planning and activities improve our capacity to innovate?

Step 3:


When I think of the services, programmes, or support our government provides...

- Where/how do I see the local or national government addressing the impacts or benefits of technological innovation on women and girls in the community I serve?
- Where/how do I see the local or national government promoting the leadership of women and girls in technological innovation or digital education?
- How could government be more supportive of the technology concerns and leadership of women and girls in the community I serve?

On the basis of our experiences, we recommend the following actions from UN Member States to maximise the empowerment potential of digital innovation while minimising its risks to women and girls..."
