What is the opening of the General Assembly

The **United Nations General Assembly** (UNGA) **is the main policy-making body of the United Nations** (UN), composed of representatives from each of the 193 UN Member States. It serves as a platform for discussion of specific issues that culminate in the voting on and adoption of resolutions.

The UNGA annual session commences in September of each year, welcoming heads of state and government to the UN Headquarters in New York. This year marks the **79th session of the UNGA** (UNGA79), which officially opened on Tuesday, 10 September, and the most prominent meetings of the opening of the General Assembly take place during **High-Level Week**, which runs from 22-28 September. During this time, world leaders, policymakers, experts, and other stakeholders gather to confront another year of complex issues and challenges. The conversations that transpire in this space will shape policy for the future.

A central component of High-Level Week is the **General Debate**. The General Debate provides a space for leaders from UN Member States to speak in front of the entire General Assembly. Heads of state and government take turns delivering statements and addressing topics of significance in front of a world audience.

In addition to the General Debate, this year's High-Level Week also features the following events: the Summit of the Future, the SDG Moment, the High-Level Meeting on Sea-Level Rise, the High-Level Meeting on Antimicrobial Resistance, and the International Day for the Total Elimination of Nuclear Weapons.

The theme of UNGA79 is "Leaving no one behind: acting together for the advancement of peace, sustainable development and human dignity for present and future generations." Accordingly, the opening of this annual session presents an opportunity for world leaders to come together and commit to collective action to accelerate progress on creating a more sustainable and peaceful future for all - leaving no one behind.

Instructions for In-Person Participation

From 1 September 2024, no new passes will be approved or issued for representatives of NGOs in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council for the duration of the high-level week of the General Assembly. Access to the United Nations premises will be granted with valid United Nations grounds passes only until 21 September 2024. From 22-30 September 2024, the use of annual and temporary grounds passes for NGOs in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council to enter the UN Headquarters complex will be suspended. The usual procedures for UN Grounds Passes will be reinstated as of 2 October 2024.

Access to the General Assembly

A limited number of special passes for the General Assembly will be distributed daily from 23-27 September by the NGO Branch of the Department of Economic and Social Affairs, on a first-come-first served basis at the corner of 2nd Avenue and 48th Street from 9:00am-10:00am and from 2:00pm-3:00pm for attendance on the same day. Tickets will be distributed upon presentation of a valid UN grounds pass. Owing to the limited number of passes available, and in order to provide equal opportunity to all NGOs in consultative status to attend the sessions, special half-day passes will be distributed to one representative of each NGO to attend either the morning session or the afternoon session of the general debate, but not both. In other words, NGOs attending the morning session cannot attend the afternoon session.

Access to Special Events

For all UN high-level meetings and events, participation of civil society and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) must be first approved through dedicated, online registration processes for each event. At the conclusion of the registration processes, participants will be notified of the approval of their registration, and will also be informed of the date, time and venue for the collection of the required Special Event Tickets (SETs). To collect their SETs, approved participants will be required to present the Letter of Approval that was sent to them by the United Nations, as well as a government-issued photo ID, such as a passport or a driver's license, etc. The SETs will indicate the name of the participant, the specific meeting, date and time of the event. Participants will be required to carry the SETs with them at all times while on UN premises. The issuance of Special Event Tickets is the responsibility of the United Nations sponsoring office. Non-United Nations guests will require a sponsoring office or delegation staff member to escort them from the access point on 2nd Avenue and 46th Street to the meeting or event location.

High-Level Meeting on Sea-Level Rise 25 September

Global leaders, experts, and stakeholders will convene to address the threat of rising sea levels.

Participants will work towards developing comprehensive solutions and actionable commitments to combat sea-level rise, ensuring a resilient and sustainable future for all.



High-Level Meeting on Antimicrobial Resistance

26 September

Governments and stakeholders will gather to accelerate progress in combating the threat of antimicrobial resistance. Participants will focus on enhancing cooperation, promoting responsible use, and the development of new treatments to safeguard global health.



<u>International Day for the Total</u> <u>Elimination of Nuclear Weapons</u>

26 September

On this occasion the world community reaffirms its commitment to global nuclear disarmament as a priority. It provides an opportunity to raise awareness about the real benefits of eliminating such weapons, and the social and economic costs of perpetuating them.

Summit of the Future

The Summit of the Future is a high-level event designed to bring world leaders together to examine the state of **international cooperation** and to chart a path forward, to improve the way we **collaborate to address future challenges and opportunities.**

The Summit is composed of plenaries and interactive dialogues focused on five main subjects: peace and security, sustainable development and financing, transforming global governance, youth and future generations, and a digital future for all. It will culminate in the adoption of three agreements:

- The <u>Pact for the Future</u> is an action-oriented document negotiated by UN Member States. It aims include reaffirming the UN Charter, strengthening cooperation between countries, advancing progress on existing commitments (such as the Sustainable Development Goals), agreeing on solutions to rising challenges, and restoring trust. The Pact will contain the following two agreements:
 - The <u>Global Digital Compact</u> will establish a global framework to tackle digital, data, and technology divides. It will outline principles, objectives and actions for advancing an open, free, secure and human-centered digital future for all.
 - The <u>Declaration for Future Generations</u> will affirm Member States' commitment to ensure that the interests of future generations are considered in national and global decision-making, guaranteeing the rights of future generations to thrive.

Everyone has a role to play in holding our respective governments responsible for implementing the commitments detailed in these adopted agreements, delivering a safer, more peaceful, just, inclusive, sustainable, and prosperous future for everyone, everywhere. Summit of the Future Action Days

As all individuals possess the capacity to play a vital role in the implementation of the Pact of the Future, it is important to provide a space for all stakeholders to participate in the process of its formulation, adoption, and follow-up. Therefore, the Summit of the Future will be proceeded by two Action Days, to provide additional opportunities for broader engagement and the inclusion of all stakeholders.

The Summit of the Future Action Days will convene representatives from UN Member States, local governments, civil society, private sector, academia, youth, and more. The two-day action-oriented event will **maintain a dedicated focus on future generations**, and it will include keynote speakers, interactive dialogues, breakout sessions, and a panel with the UN Secretary-General. The breakout sessions will address the themes of:

- 1. Innovative solutions in humanitarian action
- 2. Foresight in climate and environmental sustainability
- 3. Gender equality to empower girls and young women at the heart of multilateralism
- 4. Intergenerational equity and solidarity for a shared future
- 5. Inclusive digital future for all
- 6. Governance for human rights, peace and security, and political processes
