

Cross-Border Firearms Trafficking: Prohibited but easy







Nearly 180,000 cars and trucks cross from the United States to Mexico *every day.*

Many guns trafficked. Fewer recovered, traced, or investigated in US.


Guns trafficked to Mexico recovered in Mexico vs. in US



High volumes of guns are trafficked to Mexico from some areas: southern Texas




US sources of firearms trafficked to Caribbean


Majority of traceable firearms recovered in Caribbean 2015-2024 were purchased in Florida, especially in Miami and Orlando areas

Zip code with the largest number of traced firearms recovered in Caribbean nations is in Miramar, Florida – 194 during last decade. Most were recovered in Bahamas.

Of seven gun dealers in zip code, 5 are pawn shops. One is MG Armory, which specializes in militarized firearms.



Mexico's litigation against gun industry

- Lawsuit against manufacturers of guns trafficked for negligence:
 - Initially dismissed, appeals court reversed, gunmakers appealed to Supreme Court, which may dismiss, likely to rule in June-July
- Lawsuit against five gun dealers in Arizona with many weapons trafficked to Mexico:
 - Has advanced to "discovery" (production of evidence) phase



What is to be done?

 Write letters to editor. Use social media to highlight impacts of US gun markets and trafficking

Congressional Advocacy:

- Co-sponsor Stop Arming Cartels Act H.R. 923 / S. 367
 - Prohibits sale of .50 caliber rifles to civilians
- ARMAS Act requires re-introduction
 - Requires integrated strategy against illicit gun trafficking
 - Creates oversight and transparency for firearms exports in Americas
